Day by Day Itinerary

Friday, October 20 – CHICAGO / EN ROUTE (I)

We depart Chicago's O'Hare International Airport this afternoon by scheduled service of Iberia Airlines of Spain to begin the transatlantic journey to Madrid, Spain.

Saturday, October 21 – MADRID / NICE (I,D)

This morning we arrive in Madrid and continue by connecting flight to Nice, France. On arrival, we'll meet our Tour Guide who will introduce us to the French Riviera, also called the Côte d'Azur, which runs from the glamorous enclave of St. Tropez, through Cannes, Nice, and to the Principality of Monaco. Leaving the airport, a short drive will take us to the resort of Nice, the largest city on this fabled stretch of coast where the remainder of the day is at leisure.

Sunday, October 22 – NICE (B)

This morning we'll receive an introduction to Nice that will start along the 19th century gracious seaside Promenade des Anglais, lined with the stately mansions and elegant Belle Époque hotels. Then we'll explore the pedestrian maze of narrow streets and lanes in Vieux Ville, beginning near the Albert I Gardens at Place Massena, to the colorful Cours Saleya open-air market stalls that are at their busiest and full of color in the morning. We'll also see the unassuming facade of the Palais Lascaris and the sudden surprise of the Cathedrale de Sainte Réparate, opening up among the pastel-colored buildings of rue Droite, it is one of the most beautiful sights on the Riviera. Afterward, free time will be set aside to enjoy lunch at one of the many sidewalk cafes, before we visit the Marc Chagall Museum of Biblical Themes. The museum contains superbly displayed canvases depicting biblical scenes and themes from the Old Testament in bright, joyous colors.

Monday, October 23 – NICE (Cannes) (B)

Today we travel to the city of Cannes. Although Cannes reputation is one of chic, sassy, and incredibly sexy, it can also be surprising in the simple authenticity of its neighborhoods, bustling markets and carefree café culture. Cannes' most famous street is the promenade de la Croisette which curves along the coast and is lined with grand hotels, casinos, exclusive beach clubs, and the Palais des Festivals, home to the Cannes Film Festival. Tucked behind La Croisette is Cannes' small town center that is best explored on foot. Initially a Roman camp, Le Suquet is home to the Tour du Masque, a 12th century tower which takes its name from the famed Man in the Iron Mask. We'll also see the 12th century medieval castle and Chapel of St. Anne as we wind our way up Susquet Hill to Notre Dame d'Esperance. Built in the 16th century by the monks of Lérins, Notre Dame de l'Espérance and its recognizable clock tower have become the symbol of Old Cannes; appearing more like a gothic fortress than a church. This afternoon we'll hop aboard a ferry bound for Ile Sainte-Marguerite to the largest of the Lérins Islands, where the fragrance of pine and eucalyptus will captivate us as we step ashore. We'll stroll along the island to Fort Royal, built by Spanish troops in 1637 and used as a military barracks and parade ground until World War II. The fort later became a

state prison where the notorious Man in the Iron Mask is said to have been imprisoned before escaping. While here we'll visit the Musee de la Mer, tracing the history of the island and featuring items recovered from ancient Roman and Saracen shipwrecks.

Tuesday, October 24 – NICE (Monte Carlo) (B)

Today we travel to the independent Principality of Monaco, the home of millionaires, opulent villas, flower-covered terraces and pleasure yachts anchored in the sparkling bay. Monte Carlo's main sights are clustered around the pedestrian Place du Casino Square where we'll see both the stunning Opera House and Casino. Then, we'll take in a spectacular view of the luxury yachts anchored in the sparkling bay as we make our way to Monaco-Ville located on the promontory known as the Rock. From here we'll begin a walking tour of the Old Town and view the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Built with the stark white stones from La Turbie in 1875, this Roman-Byzantine-style building is where Prince Rainier III and Princess Grace Kelly married. Next, we're headed to Palace Square, dominated by the magnificent residence of Prince Albert II, to witness the traditional Changing of the Guard. Following our tour, free time will be set aside to explore the twisting lanes and vaulted passageways that make up Monaco-Ville which dates back to the 14th century.

Wednesday, October 25 – NICE (Eze & Saint-Jean-Cap-Ferrat) (B)

This morning we travel to the hamlet of Eze, a picture-perfect hill village that clings to the mountains 1,400 feet above the sea. Eze's fortified medieval core overlooks the coast and was built during the Middle Ages to stave off raids from Saracen pirates. We'll visit the Jardin d'Eze where the earth goddesses by sculptor Jean-Philippe Richard live harmoniously among the exotic plants. We'll also have an opportunity to soak up the atmosphere while lingering at one of the peaceful viewpoints and allow time to explore the impossibly cute streets that are home to artisan shops, boutiques and galleries. Afterward, we'll be on our way to Saint-Jean-Cap-Ferrat to visit the historic seaside Villa Ephrussi de Rothschild, a lavish Italian-style mansion surrounded by gorgeous gardens. The Villa was the romantic dream of Baroness Béatrice de Rothschild who fell in love with the fairy-tale site and built her rose-colored villa overlooking the Mediterranean Sea.

Thursday, October 26 – NICE (St. Paul de Vence, Domaine Saint-Joseph & Grasse) (B)

Today we travel inland to charming St. Paul de Vence. St. Paul gained notoriety in the 1940s and '50s when artists including Chagall, Matisse, and Picasso frequented the town. A walking tour will take us along the pedestrian rue Grande, which runs the length of town to the cemetery where Chagall is buried. Most of the stone houses along the street are from 16th and 17th centuries, and several still bear the coats of arms placed there by the original builders, allowing St. Paul to retain much of its medieval appearance. Afterward, free time will

allow an opportunity to explore the narrow, cobblestone lanes, discovering the many wonderful antique stores, boutiques, and arts-and-crafts galleries that can be found here. Before leaving St. Paul, we'll enjoy an afternoon wine tasting in the 14th century Petite Cave to learn about the fine wines from Provence. Then, we'll set our sights on Grasse, the perfume capital of the world. Grasse began as a tannery town, but in the 16th century Italian immigrant glove makers began to use local flower scents to perfume soft leather gloves. The tanneries have since vanished, but three major perfume houses are still in business, and we'll tour one of France's oldest, most esteemed perfumeries to discover the process of perfume creation.

Friday, October 27 – NICE (St. Tropez) (B)

Another leisurely day on tour will take us along the stunning coastal road known as the Golden Cornich on our way towards St. Tropez, the summer playground of Europe's youthful rich. At the town of Sainte Maxime, we'll embark on a 20-minute ferry ride to St. Tropez. On arrival, we'll enjoy a guided walking tour that will introduce us to the Old Harbor dominated by the figure of Pierre-André de Suffren, whose statue was erected by Napoleon III in 1866. We'll also see the Mole Jean Reveille jetty and seawall, which was destroyed during the Allied bombings of August 1944 and restored in 1950. Next, we'll make our way to the hilltop Citadel, a fortified castle complete with drawbridges and stunning views across the Bay of St. Tropez. From here we'll descend into the Old Town, part of which has been laid out as a pedestrian zone, where boutiques and restaurants abound, evoking medieval St. Tropez. Following our tour, free time will be set aside to gaze at the 100-year-old plane trees at the Place des Lices in the heart of St. Tropez, a delightful place to stroll even if our visit doesn't coincide with a market day.

Saturday, October 28 – NICE (B,D)

As we'll soon learn, Nice attractions range from world famous to more obscure, and are found all over the city. The



day is at leisure to soak up the sun and stroll the Promenade des Anglais, return to the Old Town for independent exploration, or head up to the beautiful residential neighborhood of Cimiez where you'll find some of the best museums in town, most notably the Matisse Museum. The museum is housed the 17th-century Arena Villa and its highlights include the two famous paintings "Still Life with Pomegranates" and Matisse's last completed work "Flowers and Fruits." Whatever you choose to do, Nice has something for everyone.

Sunday, October 29 – NICE / CHICAGO (I)

Early this morning we depart Nice and travel to Nice International Airport in preparation for the return journey home. No better time to reflect on memories of our *French Riviera* vacation to last a lifetime and new friendships made along the way!
