Day by Day Itinerary

(B,L)

Wednesday, March 6 – CHICAGO / EN ROUTE (I) We depart Chicago's O'Hare International Airport late this evening by scheduled service of EVA Airways on the non-stop transpacific flight to Taipei, Thailand.

Thursday, March 7 – EN ROUTE (I) During our flight we cross the "International Date Line" and therefore our arrival in Taipei will be on Friday, March 8.


Friday, March 8 – TAIPEI / HO CHI MINH (I,D) On arrival at Taoyuan International Airport this morning we change planes for the connecting flight to Ho Chi Minh. Known as Saigon prior to 1975, today Ho Chi Minh is Vietnam's commercial capital and is fast becoming the nation's window to the world. Although Ho Chi Minh has rapidly developed into a modern city, there are still remnants of its past visible in the historic landmarks and beautiful French colonial buildings dotted throughout the city. Upon arrival, we'll meet our Tour Guide, who will accompany us on tour, and begin our introduction to Vietnam.

Saturday, March 9 – HO CHI MINH (Cu Chi Tunnels)

This morning we travel northwest of Ho Chi Minh to tour the **Cu Chi tunnels**, an immense network of connecting underground tunnels that are part of a much larger network of tunnels that underlie much of the country. The Cu Chi tunnels were the location of several military campaigns during the Vietnam War and were the Viet Cong's base of operations for the Tet Offensive in 1968. Preserved as a memorial park, two sections of this remarkable network are open to the public. We'll visit the area at Ben Dinh, where there is an option to go below the surface and visit sections of the tunnels first-hand.

This afternoon we'll enjoy an introductory tour of Ho Chi Minh's historic landmarks. We'll begin with a visit to the Reunification Palace. Set on well-maintained and spacious grounds, this historic building was assured its place in history on April 30, 1975, when the first North Vietnamese tanks rumbled past, signaling the Fall of Saigon and ultimately the end of the Vietnam War. Nearby we'll also visit Notre Dame Cathedral, a 19th-century cathedral covered with red ceramic tiles shipped in from France, which serves as a popular backdrop for wedding photographs. Across the street is the city's striking French colonial-era Post Office, and the former Hôtel de Ville, officially Ho Chi Minh's City Hall. Before leaving the area around Dong Khoi Street in District 1 we'll tour the Museum of Vietnamese History. Built in a classic pagoda style, the museum contains an excellent series of exhibits dating from the Bronze Age to the Nguyen dynasty, the last ruling family of Vietnam. Our day of touring ends following a visit to the unforgettable Jade Emperor Pagoda. With the pungent smell of incense hanging heavy in the air, this Taoist temple is one of the most atmospheric places of worship in the city.

Sunday, March 10 – HO CHI MINH (Mekong Delta) (B,L) Today we travel to the Mekong Delta, a rich fertile region of



farmland interlaced with countless waterways crisscrossed by low-lying rice paddies. As we'll soon learn, life in the Mekong Delta continues much as it has done for centuries. We'll visit Ben Tre, one of the lesser-visited provinces in the Mekong Delta, and cruise along the Ham Luong River, visiting small factories that provide an insight into how the local economy works. Stops will include a brickworks; a salt refinery; coconut processing workshop; as well as a mat weaving house, where straw mats are woven using a hand loom – you can even have a go at weaving yourself!

Monday, March 11 – HO CHI MINH / SIEM REAP (B,D) Today we depart Ho Chi Minh and Vietnam as we take to the skies for Cambodia. Our destination is Siem Reap, a charming provincial town defined by a cluster of villages, Chinese-style shop houses, and French-colonial architecture. However, Siem Reap may be best known as the gateway to the Temples of Angkor. Designated a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1992, the Angkor Archaeological Park encompasses dozens of temple ruins whose artistic and archaeological significance and visual impact place it alongside other wonders of the world.

Tuesday, March 12 – SIEM REAP

(Angkor Thom, Ta Prohm & Angkor Wat) (B,L)

This morning begins with a visit to **Angkor Thom**, the ancient royal city of the Khmer Empire. Located in the heart of the complex is the Bayon, one of the city's most extraordinary structures, epitomizing the "lost civilization" of Angkor. Then we're headed to picturesque **Ta Prohm**. This temple is considered Angkor's most beautiful structure and is overgrown with fig trees, giving a haunting yet exotic atmosphere.

After lunch, we'll visit the most famous of all temples on the Angkor plain. **Angkor Wat**, which literally means "the city which is a Temple" is the best preserved example of Khmer

architecture in Cambodia and is so grand in design that some rank it among the Seven Wonders of the World. The "lost city" of Angkor first attracted the interest of Europeans in the 1800s after Cambodia was colonized by the French. Today, Angkor Wat continues to draw thousands of visitors anxious to see this remarkable ancient temple.

Wednesday, March 13 – SIEM REAP (Kampong Phluk)

(**B**,L)

Today we travel to Kampong Phluk to learn about the lives of the Cambodian people who live on the edge of Tonle Sap Lake. The community is actually a cluster of three villages of stilted houses built within the giant floodplain of the Tonle Sap. We'll board a boat and weave our way through the narrow village channels of Southeast Asia's largest freshwater lake that is the lifeblood of rural life in Cambodia. Flooded mangrove forests surround the area and are home to a large variety of wildlife. As part of our tour, we'll visit a market to witness the sale of fresh produce being traded by the locals who have been trading in this way for many years.





After lunch and before returning to Siem Reap, we'll visit the remote temple complex of Banteay Srei. Unlike most other monuments in Angkor, **Banteay Srei** is not a royal temple. The 'Citadel of Women' is cut from stone of a pinkish hue that features some of the finest stone carving anywhere on earth. We'll also visit lesser known **Banteay Samre**, a Hindu temple built in the Angkor Wat style named after the Samré, an ancient people of Indochina.

Thursday, March 14 – SIEM REAP / HO CHI MINH (B) Today we say "lee hi" to Siem Reap and Cambodia as we once again take to the skies on our return to Ho Chi Minh's Tan Son Nhat International Airport. Upon arrival, we'll transfer to our downtown hotel in preparation for the following days transpacific journey home.

Friday, March 15 – HO CHI MINH / CHICAGO (B,I) This morning we return to Suvarnabhumi International Airport in preparation for the journey home. No better time to reflect on memories of our *Southeast Asian Odyssey* to last a lifetime and celebrate the beginning of new friendships made along the way!
